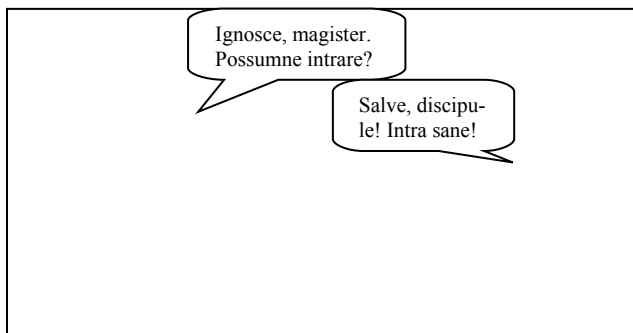

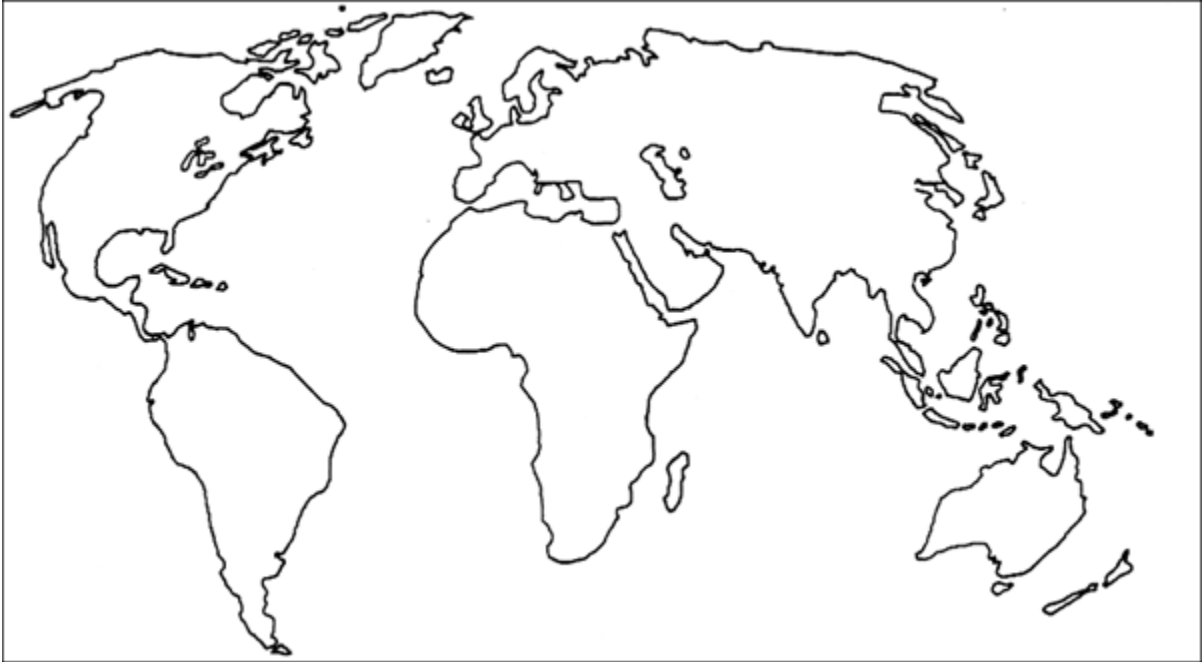

De Alphabeto Latino:

Alphabetus Latinus idem est atque Anglicus, sed “i” = “j” et “u” = “v”.

De pronuntiatu:

Tres sunt pronuntiatu: a) Classicus vel Restitutus, b) Ecclesiasticus et c) Vernacularis vel Vulgaris.

Classicus vel Restitutus	Ecclesiasticus	Vernacularis vel Vulgaris
<p>c is always hard, as in cat (never soft as in nice)</p> <p>g is always hard, as in God (except when it is followed by n; gn is sounded ngn, as in hangnail, so magnus is pronounced mangnus.</p> <p>h is always sounded, as in hope.</p> <p>i is used as a consonant as well as vowel; as a consonant it sounds like English y; so Latin iam is pronounced yam.</p> <p>q is never found except when followed by u, sounded as in English quick.</p> <p>s is always voiceless, as in sit (never like z, as in rose).</p> <p>v is pronounced like English w; vidi sounds weede.</p> <p>Where double consonants occur, as in sitting, both consonants are pronounced; so ille is pronounced il-le (l is sounded twice).</p>	<p>c is tj before i and e; Cicero is Tjitjero.</p> <p>g is dj before i and e; magister is madjister.</p> <p>v is pronounced like English v.</p>	<p>all sounds will adapt to the pronunciation of the homeland Latin course.</p>
